LotoJa to run

Mike Baughman, 25, Logan perhaps summed it up best. 'There are parts out there that are just not fun," he said.

Yet he and some 200 other cyclists are living for Saturday's 6:45 a.m. starting of the 8th annual LotoJa cycling classic, a 200-mile wind from Logan to Teton Village, near Jackson,

Why? No one really seems able to pinpoint the logic, Afterall, the cyclists will spend most of Saturday's daylight hours pushing and sweating, pedaling and huffing, aching and exerting just to see if, and when, they can cross some thin white finish line three states away. It just doesn't make sense.

But, say the participants, that's

the beauty of LotoJa.
"It has a lot of appeal," says race organizer Jeff Keller, "A lot of people have this goal of riding 200 miles on their bicycle in one day."

Keller said LotoJa, which originally started as a friendly little jaunt for a small group of friends, is now like a European classic

"As strange as it sounds, to be riding in the mountains, it's quite a flat course. If you take the total elevation gain and loss it's really not that great.

"This race, we run in the tradition of the European one-day classic, so the riders can really think of themselves as having entered a classic," Keller said.

"The interesting thing about LotoJa," said Baughman, "is that you may feel terrible at one section and 40 or 50 miles later you might feel great."

But perhaps even more interesting is Baughman's approach to the marathon event. A top-ten finisher in each of the four years he has participated, training for LotoJa is now a science for Baughman.

"You try to forget about the pain from last year," he said. "I kind of try to put it out of my mind all season long until maybe a couple weeks before the race. and then I'll start to think about

"It's a mental game," Baughman said. "Of course you have to be trained for it, but it's more of a mental game than anything else."

This year's race will have the largest number of participants in LotoJa's history. Already, 176 riders have pre-registered, more

are expected to sign up Saturday

morning.
Race Director Margaret Lubke, one of 10 women entered. said she would like to see even more people enjoying LotoJa.

"I'd like to make it more of a community event," said Lubke. And she has her plans, but this year the goal is a personal one.

In a previous running, Lubke

crossed the finish line 12 hours and 54 minutes into the race, this year she wants to finish before dark. At 39, Lubke says she is the oldest woman registered, but that doesn't matter.

Anyone who seriously thinks about riding LotoJa is winner; anyone who finishes is a champion.



LO-TO-JA CLASSIC

Originating in 1983 with only 9 competitors, the LOTOJA Classic has become a pre-eminent cycling event taking place in the tri-state territories of Utah, Idaho, and Wyoming.

The 8th annual LOTOJA Classic will prove to have the biggest field of race competitors the event has seen yet. Cycling enthusiasts, from all across the western United States are expected to gather in Logan, Utah to compete in one of the most challenging of cycling events. The LOTOJA Classic will take the cyclists 203 miles through flat, hilly and mountainous landscape of Utah, Idaho, and Wyoming.





Attaching Race Number to Bicycle Frame



The race number attaches underneath the top tube just behind the head tube and straddles the shift levers. There are three holes in the number to accomodate 3 ties (plastic or twist type). Two attach to the top tube and one at the head tube.

RULES FOR RACERS

- 1. All USCF regulations apply.
- Obey all traffic lights especially at Preston, Soda Springs, and Jackson. Unfortunately, we are unable to convince the highway patrol to monitor the lights, so they must be obeyed.
- All riders must have a support crew, however we encourage riders to share crews.
- 4. No crossing the yellow line at any time.
- Musette bags must be dropped on the right side of the road to prevent any accidents.
- Riders who reach Alpine Junction after 5:00 pm, will automatically be withdrawn from the race.
- 7. Racers who think they may not arrive at Teton Village before 7:00 pm must equip their bicycles with headlights, and don reflective clothing when it begins to get dark.
- Finish line will be manned until dark, or 7:45 pm, whichever comes first.
- 9. Unsafe and unsportsmanlike conduct will not be tolerated.
- 10. Obey all directions of race officials, or time penalties will be assessed for both rider and support crew violations. RIDERS: YOU WILL BE PENALIZED FOR VIOLATIONS COMMITTED BY YOUR SUPPORT CREWS.
- 11. Do not liter, especially around Highway Patrol.

PARTICIPATION IN THE LO-TO-JA CLASSIC CONSTITUTES AGREEMENT TO OBEY THESE RULES.

FOLLOWING IS A BREAKDOWN OF THE PENALTIES TO BE ASSESSED FOR VIOLATIONS

1st violation - 30 seconds 2nd violation - 1 minute 3rd violation - 2 minutes 4th violation - 4 minutes 5th violation - MAKE OUR DAY 6th violation - NUKE 'EM

TIME PENALTIES WILL BE CUMULATIVE AND ADDED TO THE RIDER'S TIME.

BECAUSE OF THE NATURE OF THIS RACE AND PAST EXPERIENCES WITH RIDERS AND SUPPORT CREWS, THE LO-TO-JA RACE COMMITTEE IS COMPELLED TO STRICTLY ENFORCE THE PENALTIES THAT MAY BE ASSESSED FOR VIOLATIONS OF THE FOLLOWING RULES. THIS ACTION IS BEING TAKEN TO INSURE THE SAFETY OF BOTH RIDERS AND CREWS, AS WELL AS THE FUTURE OF THE LO-TO-JA CLASSIC.

RULES FOR CREWS

- 1. All USCF regulations apply.
- Support vehicles should remain 100 yards back from riders, except when passing.
- Support crews must display riders race number on front and rear windows of vehicle.
- Do not impede the flow of regular traffic at any time. Idaho and 4. Wyoming State law require that vehicles having more than 3 vehicles behind them must pull over and allow them to pass. Therefore, crews should keep an eye on mirrors, and pull over to allow traffic to pass through. In certain areas, (approximately 3 miles north of Preston until Niter), crews should "leapfrog" their racers, and not follow directly behind. This is a very winding and hilly area, and racers must have a clear road on which to climb. Race officials are instructed to pull over all support vehicles (until riders are through) if crews do not pull over on their own. Penalties will be assessed. Once on Highway 89 in Wyoming, crews should plan on "leapfrogging" their racers, as the Highway Patrol dose not allow following directly behind riders. (This is very important). Race staff will try to correct support crews before the police, please follow their instructions.
- 5. Feeding of racers only at designated feeding stations. No hand-ups from moving vehicles, or a racer will be fined and penalized.
- 6. All feeding of racers must be done while standing along the roadside and using musette bags to contain items.
- 7. No support vehicles will drive alongside riders at any time, except to pass.
- 8. No large support vehicles, such as R.V.'s that block the view of following vehicles, will be allowed.
- Support crews are encouraged to have signs in rear window stating, "CAUTION, BIKE RACE IN PROGRESS".

PARTICIPATION IN THE LO-TO-JA CLASSIC CONSTITUTES AGREEMENT TO OBEY THESE RULES.

FOLLOWING IS A BREAKDOWN OF THE PENALTIES TO BE ASSESSED FOR VIOLATIONS

1st violation - 30 seconds 4th violation - 4 minutes 2nd violation - 1 minute 5th violation - MAKE OUR DAY 3rd violation - 2 minutes 6th violation - NUKE 'EM

TIME PENALTIES WILL BE CUMULATIVE AND ADDED TO THE RIDER'S TIME.

On behalf of the LOTOJA Classic Race Committee, I would like to thank all of the people who helped make the eighth annual LotoJa Classic a huge success including riders, support crews, emergency medical technicians, neutral support crews, motorcyle riders, radio communication people, media persons, and race officials. The radio communication system this year was a new addition to the race and was found to be extremely helpful. Although no one broke the 8 hours, 10 minutes, and 30 seconds record, Dwight Hall came close with 8 hours, 13 minutes and 32 seconds.

Please find enclosed a copy of the race results. We had 189 riders registered and 147 who finished. EMTs treated several riders for scrapes and bruises. The number of accidents increased this year over past years and this will be a critical concern in planning next year's race. Saturday, September 14, is the day to reserve for next year's race. We have invited Tom Bonacci to again serve as race official as we were most impressed with his efforts. We hope you can join us next year and help us further the long established tradition of this race.

Seeing the race from the perspective of my bicycle seat this year reminded me of the importance this event can play in one's life: training, planning, preparing, and reaching toward a personal goal enriches the lives of all those who get involved. To paraphrase a sportswriter from Logan's Herald Journal, all those who attempt this race are winners, those who finish are champions!
